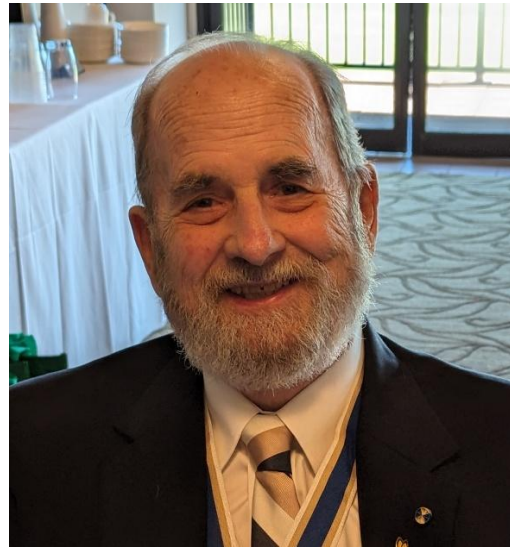
Lillian Ferencz was born on April 13, 1938 in Buffalo, New York.

Few women of the American Revolution have come through 250 years of US history with such clarity and color as Angelica Schuyler Church. She was Alexander Hamilton's "saucy" sister-in-law, and the heart of Thomas Jefferson's "charming coterie" of artists and *salonnières* in Paris. Her transatlantic network of important friends spanned the political spectrum of her time and place, and her astute eye and brilliant letters kept them well informed.

A woman of great influence in a time of influential women (Catherine the Great and Marie-Antoinette were contemporaries), Angelica was at the red-hot center of American history at its birth: in Boston, when General Burgoyne surrendered to the revolutionaries; in Newport, receiving French troops under the command of her soon-to-be dear friend Marquis de Lafayette; in Yorktown, just after the decisive battle; in Paris and London, helping to determine the standing of the new nation on the world stage.

She was born as Engeltje, a Dutch-speaking, slave-owning colonial girl who witnessed the Stamp Act riots in the Royal British Province of New York. She came of age under English rule as Angelica, the eldest daughter of the most important family on the northern part of Hudson's River, raised to be a domestic diplomat responsible for hosting indigenous chiefs and enemy British generals at dinner. She was Madame Church, wife of a privateer turned merchant banker, whose London house was a refuge for veterans of the American war fleeing the guillotine in France. Across nationalities, languages, and cultures, across the divides of war, grievance, and geography, Angelica wove a web of soft-power connections that spanned

the War for Independence, the post-war years of tenuous peace, and the turbulent politics and rival ideologies that threatened to tear apart the nascent United States

In this enthralling and revealing woman's-eye view of a revolutionary era, Molly Beer breathes vibrant new life into a period usually dominated by masculine themes and often dulled by familiarity. In telling Angelica's story, she illuminates how American women have always plied influence and networks for political ends, including the making of a new nation.

Live Free or Die: The Life and Times of John Stark

Live Free or Die: The Life and Times of John Stark is the story of how the American Revolution's best battlefield commander (the author's assertion) triumphed over the self-interest of others to play a major role in securing victory for the new republic.

Most often referred to as the "Hero of the Battle of Bennington," John Stark also played pivotal roles in the Battle

of Bunker Hill and the Battle of Trenton.

In the French and Indian War, he saw continuous action along the Richelieu River-Lake Champlain corridor as a member of Rogers's Rangers. In the end, he became the conscience of the rangers when he voiced his disapproval of the motives and tactics of group leader Robert Rogers.

Stark's actions at Bunker Hill, when his militia troops repeatedly repulsed British advances, avoided a disaster that would have snuffed out the rebellion. He was a modest man whose actions always spoke louder than words, and his incomparable leadership that day was all but ignored by New Hampshire's rebel governing authority.

At Trenton, Stark was in the vanguard of Washington's right flank along the River Road. It is likely that he also had a major role during both the Battle of Princeton and the Springfield Raid, though it is difficult to know for certain as most contemporary accounts are offered by those seeking self-glorification, a quality unknown to Stark.

His reward for his well-proven ability to lead troops in combat was to be repeatedly spurned when Congress appointed general officers. Not one of those officers could challenge Stark's record on the battlefield. Completely frustrated, he quit the army and

returned to his farm and sawmill in New Hampshire.

Three months later, with the British under John Burgoyne threatening to overrun New Hampshire, Vermont, and New York, he was persuaded to return. He did so on the condition that he would take no orders from any officer of the Continental Army.

What happened next is where John Stark's story becomes even more interesting.

In *Live Free or Die: The Life and Times of John Stark*, William R. Baker Jr. has deftly interwoven the remarkable story of one of this country's most self-reliant and original personalities with a lively and informative account of the early America he helped to create.



250 Years Ago

1775

2 December: First of General Montgomery's troops joined Arnold's at Point aux Trembles and combined patriot force of 800 effectives began siege of Quebec, a well-fortified city defended by 1,800 British regulars and British and French-Canadian militia.

9 December: Lord Dunsmore sent force of 400 or so, half British regulars, to intercept patriot force advancing on Norfolk, Virginia. In rashly attacking instead of defending crossing at Great Bridge, Virginia, British forces suffered 62 casualties as against one patriot slightly wounded, and were completely routed in this first military action of the war in Virginia.

10 December: Connecticut men in Washington's Army, enlisted only until this date, departed for home, emphasizing Washington's

problem in enlisting an adequate army.

13 December: After action at Great Bridge, Norfolk, Virginia, was occupied by patriots. Also, on this day Congress authorized the construction of thirteen ships- five 32's, five 28's and three 24's- for the Continental Navy.

22 December: Parliament passed the Prohibitory Act, interdicting foreign trade and intercourse with the thirteen revolting colonies.

31 December: With enlistments expiring, Montgomery and Arnold led 800 patriots in a desperate and unsuccessful attack on Quebec, Canada. (Quebec Campaign), during a blinding snowstorm in the early hours of the next year. Montgomery was killed and Arnold was wounded among 60 patriots killed and wounded, and 426 captured. British lost 5 killed and 13 wounded.

Honoring America's Veterans November 11, 2025

For over 100 years, Americans have paused on November 11 to remember the sacrifices of the men and women who have served in the Armed Forces of our country. We are honored to have more than 15 million living veterans with us today.

In 1953, President and Compatriot Dwight D. Eisenhower issued the first Veterans Day Proclamation and called on us to “solemnly remember the sacrifices of all those who fought so valiantly, on the seas, in the air, and on foreign shores, to preserve our heritage of freedom, and let us reconsecrate ourselves to the task of promoting an enduring peace so that their efforts shall not have been in vain.”

The members of the Sons of the American Revolution have always remembered and honored those sacrifices in a variety of ways. This year, we have joined the Face the Fight coalition. Led by the Elizabeth Dole Foundation and USAA, Face the Fight is a

coalition of corporations, foundations, nonprofit and veteran-focused organizations joined together to raise awareness and support for veteran suicide prevention.

Here are the difficult facts we must face: The veteran suicide rate is 60% higher than the national average. Over 125,000 veterans have died by suicide since 2001. Nearly 40% of veterans who died by suicide did not have diagnoses of mental health or substance abuse disorders. Suicide is the second leading cause of death among veterans under 45 years old. Suicide rates for male veterans between 18 and 34 years old nearly doubled since 2006.

As the descendants of America's first veterans, we honor their sacrifices by supporting today's veterans. Our support for and involvement with Face the Fight will help the coalition's efforts to break the stigmas surrounding veteran suicide and save the lives of men and women who have served our country. I hope you will join our efforts to address the national tragedy of

veteran suicide. I believe that our Patriot ancestors would approve.

Therefore, this Veterans Day, I ask you to pause not only to remember the past sacrifices of America's living veterans but to consider the ongoing struggles they face following their service to our country.

A Tricorn hat (Black trim)

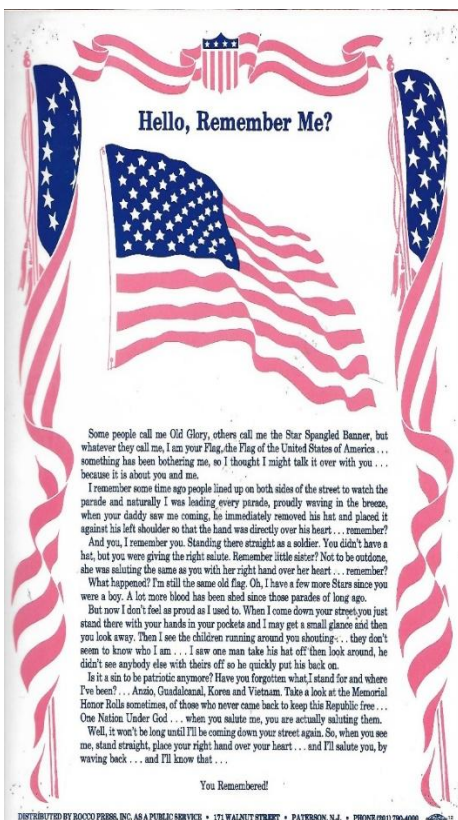
SAR striped tie
