Looking forward, we have three main events happening in the first four months of 2026.

January 16-26 brings the Traveling Revolutionary War Exhibit and George Washington's Tent to the Clearwater

Historical Museum. We are asked to participate daily by being available to discuss Revolutionary Battles and other aspects of the War. In February, the Traveling Exhibit will be at the Dunedin Historical Museum.

In March we will dedicate the First Amphibious Assault Memorial

In April we will dedicate a Liberty Tree at the Veterans Memorial section at Crest Lake Park in Clearwater.

But looking back, we accomplished so many things in 2025. We received approval from the Clearwater Parks Department and the Clearwater Veterans Park to dedicate a Liberty Tree in April. We finalized the creation of a Chapter Website (ClearwaterSAR.com). We reached the Silver Level for contributions supporting the First Amphibious Assault Memorial. 



Books about the American Revolution - Two books about John Hancock

John Hancock: First to Sign, First to Invest in America's Independence by Willard Sterne Randall

- **Publisher :** Dutton

A contemporary of Samuel Adams, John Adams, George Washington, and the Marquis de Lafayette, Hancock had a list of contacts that read like a who's who of the American Revolution. But shockingly little has been written about Hancock himself. *John Hancock* tells the story of a man who deserves far more credit for his contribution to the American Revolution than he previously received—and award-winning scholar Willard Sterne Randall is determined to give him his due at last.

Born into relatively modest means, Hancock was sent to live with his wealthy uncle and aunt as a child. The couple raised him as their own and prepared him to take over the family company. A remarkably successful businessman, Hancock got involved in politics in the mid-1760s. He quickly rose in the ranks, eventually serving as the president of the Continental Congress and the first governor of Massachusetts.

John Hancock details all of the major moments in the Revolution, from the Boston Tea Party to the battles of Lexington and Concord to the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Hancock's actions fundamentally altered each of these events—and ultimately the course of the United States—in ways never taught in the history books. Randall also dives into lesser-known parts of Hancock's life with nuance and compassion, including his education and controversial work with Harvard; his long courtship and complicated marriage to

Dorothy Quincy; and his close relationship and eventual bitter rivalry with Samuel Adams.

John Hancock enjoyed great popularity in Massachusetts during the Revolution, but he left behind few personal writings, making it hard to tell his story. Through extensive research, Randall aims to restore Hancock to his rightful place, celebrated for his achievements as one of our Founding Fathers at last.

Randall is recognized as a first class historian.

King Hancock: The Radical Influence of a Moderate Founding Father by Brooke Barbier

A rollicking portrait of the paradoxical patriot, whose measured pragmatism helped make American independence a reality.

Americans are surprisingly more familiar with his famous signature than with the man himself. In this spirited account of John Hancock's life, Brooke Barbier depicts a patriot of

fascinating contradictions—a child of enormous privilege who would nevertheless become a voice of the common folk; a pillar of society uncomfortable with radicalism who yet was crucial to independence. About two-fifths of the American population held neutral or ambivalent views about the Revolution, and Hancock spoke for them and to them, bringing them along.

Orphaned young, Hancock was raised by his merchant uncle, whose business and vast wealth he inherited—including household slaves, whom Hancock later freed. By his early thirties, he was one of New England's most prominent politicians, earning a place on Britain's most-wanted list and the derisive nickname King Hancock. While he eventually joined the revolution against England, his ever moderate—and moderating—disposition would prove an asset after 1776. Barbier shows Hancock appealing to southerners and northerners, Federalists and Anti-Federalists. He was a famously steadyng force as president of the fractious Second Continental Congress. He parlayed with French military officials, strengthening a key alliance with his hospitable

diplomacy. As governor of Massachusetts, Hancock convinced its delegates to vote for the federal Constitution and calmed the fallout from the shocking Shays's Rebellion.

An insightful study of leadership in the revolutionary era, *King Hancock* traces a moment when passion was on the side of compromise and accommodation proved the basis of profound social and political change.



November, making this portion of patriot Army "Continental in every respect"; but only about 5,500 were present and fit for duty.

1 January: First patriot flag bearing seven red and six white stripes raised at Cambridge, Massachusetts, in recognition of reorganization of Continental forces before Boston.

1 January: Governor Dunsmore, following patriot refusal to allow him to send ashore parties for provisions, bombarded and set fire to Norfolk, Virginia's largest town.

5 January: New Hampshire adopted new written constitution replacing its colonial charter, first of the 13 colonies to do so.

5 January: Continental Congress ordered work on Constitution Island (opposite West Point) suspended and emphasis placed on Fort Montgomery.

6 January: Alexander Hamilton's New York artillery battery constituted organization that became only Continental Army unit to have officially recognized modern active

1 January: American forces besieging Boston reorganized in accordance with Congressional resolve of preceding

army descendant, the 1st Battalion, 5th Artillery.

10 January: Royal Governor Josiah Martin of North Carolina, from aboard British sloop *Scorpion*, urged loyalists to gather near Wilmington on Cape Fear River to collaborate with forthcoming British Army offensive in the South.

10 January: Thomas Paine's pamphlet *Common Sense* was published in Philadelphia, urging Americans to declare independence.

12-14 January: Sailors from British ships stationed at Newport raided Patience, Hope, and Prudence Islands in Narragansett Bay, Rhode Island, and on Prudence engaged militia from Bristol and Warren in a 3-hour fight.

20 January:
Patriot General Philip Schuyler in New York, leading 3,000 militia, forced Sir John Johnson of Johnstown, New York, and 700 other loyalists, to surrender, thereby breaking back of loyalist resistance in Albany area and assuring neutrality of neighboring Indians for some time to come.

20 January: General Henry Clinton left Boston with about 1,200 troops to lead British expedition against Carolinas.

23 January: Patriot group from Elizabethtown (modern Elizabeth), New Jersey, led by William Alexander (better known, if inaccurately, as Lord Sterling) and Elias Dayton, captured British supply ship *Blue Mountain Valley* 40 miles off Sandy Hook.

24 January: Col. Henry Knox, Washington's artillery chief, who on preceding 15 November had been sent to fetch cannon captured at Ticonderoga, returned to Cambridge, Massachusetts, with 55 guns.
